### WINTON.

At New Glasgow Amherst County, VA Built By Col. Joseph Cabell 1772 Sold to Col. Samuel Meredith 1778. Who Married Jane Henry Sister of Patrick Henry. time to have some historical organization assume the permanent care and upkeep of the grave of Patrick Henry's mother, Sarah Henry, who is buried at "Winton", five miles north of Amherst, on U. S. route 29, it is interesting to note that the will of Sarah Henry is recorded at Amherst.

#### Mrs. Henry's Will

Information secured from members of her family is to the effect that Mrs. Henry died while visiting her daughter. Jane Meredith, the wife of Col. Samuel Meredith, then owner of "Winton." For various reasons, the main one being difficulty of transportation, she was buried there instead of at "Red Hill," the Henry family home. Some years ago one of her descendants had the grave cared for, but it is said now to be in need of further attention.

By her will, which is dated March 12. 1784, and was probated May 2. 1785, she gives to her three sons. John Syme, William Henry and Patrick Henry, and to her daughters, Lucy Wood, Anne Christian and Susannah Madison, a mourning ring and to her daughter, Sarah Madison, twenty pounds current money. To her daughter, Elizabeth Russell, she leaves a number of Negroes. Grandchildren mentioned in the will are Elizabeth Henry, Jane Henry Meredith, Sarah Winston Christian, John Henry Madison, Charles Henry Campbell and Sarah Buchanan Campbell.

Executors of the will are her sons-in-law, Samuel Meredith, William Russell and William Christian, her son, Patrick Henry, and her friend, Edmund Winston. Witnesses to the will were James Franklin, James Higginbotham and Joseph

Barnet.
